

North Cerney Church of England Primary Academy – Early Help Offer

Early help is important because it ensures vulnerable children and their families receive the help they need when they need it. At North Cerney CofE Primary Academy we know that family life can be challenging. There are times when some families may need extra help and support. The school values Safeguarding training at all levels. The Designated Safeguarding Lead receives multi-agency training and staff are trained and updated in safeguarding responsibilities including FGM and Prevent. Staff are vigilant, listen to children and make referrals as required. The school has good links with the local Families First Plus Team who provide support and advice around early help and early help assessments via an early help coordinator and a community social worker.

We incorporate strategies into our teaching to help keep our children safe and aware of risks. For example: E-safety assemblies and In the Net (drama for LKS2); E-safety workshop for parents; NSPCC assembly /Childline for Y5 and Y6; Anti-bullying week

Family Support

Please come to talk to us if you are finding things difficult at home. There are many ways in which we can help.

- We have an open door policy and are always available to listen to parents concerns.
- We take the time to listen to children's worries and concerns. Pupils are encouraged to share their concerns and all staff know the importance of sharing information and working together to support pupils who have worries. Pupils are regularly discussed in weekly staff meetings, where any concerns are shared with the team.
- Taking the time to listen to families. All staff take the time to listen and respond to information parents share about life outside school, changes and difficulties that we need to be aware of.
- Circle time and PSHE sessions and SEAL resources provide a forum for pupils to share and discuss more general concerns, alongside teaching key skills and strategies to support them through challenges and difficult situations.



- We have links with a counselling service to offer more specific support for particularly challenging times.
- The school has run bespoke parenting classes to provide support for common family issues.
