<ul style="list-style-type: none">Jesus told many parables about the Kingdom of God. These suggest that God’s rule has begun, through the life, teaching and example of Jesus and through the lives of Christians who follow his teachings.The Lord’s prayer shows Christians what the kingdom of God is like and how they are expected to behave.Jesus’ key teaching in the first three Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) is that he is beginning a kingdom where God’s rule of love, forgiveness and inclusion will grow.Many Christians try to extend the Kingdom of God by challenging unjust social structures in their locality and in the world.The Kingdom of God is, in essence, where God rules — not a geographical territory, but in human hearts and minds, lives and communities.
